DEPUTY PRINCIPAL LEARNING AND TEACHING NEWS PREP — YEAR 12

Homework

With the second half of the year underway and, for many year levels, preparations for 2019 already underway, it is essential that all students are actively developing good routines with respect to their homework. By the time students are in Year 12, the 12-15 hours of homework they undertake per week is a vital element of their preparations for success in VCE and the ability to utilise this time effectively is a skill that develops over many years.

To have a successful homework program, students need to have good self-management and time managements skills, good organisational skills and a proactive, motivated approach to their learning.

The College recommends the following levels of homework at each year level:

Prep to Year 2: 1 - 2 ½ hours per week

Year 3-6: 2 ½ - 3 hours per week Year 7-8: 4 - 6 hours per week Year 9-10: 7-10 hours per week Year 11: 10-12 hours per week Year 12: 12-15 hours per week

Frequently, a student in the upper Secondary school is struggling with their performance in examinations it becomes clear when we discuss this with them that a key factor in their struggles to manage the requirements of their senior years is that they have not developed an effective homework and study program over the preceding years.

In discussion with many parents about homework, I think the answer lies in the questions you ask at home. Parents will often ask their child: 'Have you got any homework?' and receive the response: 'No'. Instead, set a regular time for your son or daughter at home to complete homework and change the question to: 'So, what are you going to work on tonight?' By making it an assumption that your child will complete the recommended amount of homework time, you help them to make this a regular part of their routine and encourage a proactive approach to consolidate their learning and skills.

Ideally, have your son or daughter complete their homework in a family space, rather than isolated in a bedroom or separate area. If they are using technology during this time, ensure that the screen is visible to you; escaping onto social networking or internet browsing during this time will be a hard habit for your son or daughter to try to break in VCE.

Build in opportunities for your child to read every day without the distraction of screens – whether they are reading aloud to you in junior primary or reading to themselves and then discussing what they have read with you. In secondary years, if it is possible to have a parent or older sibling read the set texts your child is reading in English, the opportunity for them to discuss the themes, characters and ideas of the text can be a fantastic way to clarify their own thinking and to develop sophisticated interpretations of their novels.

If your son or daughter has nights when they have not been allocated specific tasks to complete, they can still use their homework time profitably by:

In primary years:

- · Practising sight words,
- Working on number recognition, number facts etc.
- Reading
- Completing wider reading/research about a topic currently being studied
- Teaching a younger sibling something they are currently learning
- Using online programs eg. Reading Eggs, Mathletics, Sunshine Online, Spellodrome,
- Pre-reading for upcoming topics

In junior secondary:

- Completing additional or extension tasks eg. Maths exercises
- Reading or re-reading their English texts
- Beginning preparation for upcoming assignments
- Writing practice essays for English
- Using MathsSpace (junior years)
- Practising their Italian/Japanese on Education Perfect
- Pre-reading for upcoming topics eg. their next Maths unit
- Completing wider reading/research about a topic currently being studied

In senior secondary (9-12):

- Reviewing notes or progressively preparing revision notes for semester examinations
- Revising new concepts taught in class that day
- Reading or re-reading their English texts
- Writing practice essays for English or other subjects
- Completing additional or extension tasks eg. Maths exercises
- Completing wider reading/research about a topic currently being studied
- Reading the newspaper (not just the Sport Section) to practise analysing the language used in articles and broaden their general knowledge
- Attempting practice examinations (available to Year 12s on the VCAA website)
- Pre-reading for upcoming topics eg. their next Maths unit
- Reviewing feedback on assignments and reattempting questions or tasks that were unsatisfactory to consolidate their understanding and skills

Japan Tour 2018 Student Reflections

From July 2 - 17, fifteen students including myself went on the 2018 Japanese tour. Dragging ourselves to the Melbourne airport early in the morning, and flying for about 13 hours with a brief stop in Hong Kong before landing at Osaka Airport at 10:00pm. Our First stop in Japan was the former capital of Kyoto. We went to places such as the Golden Pavilion, Nijō Castle and Fushimi Inari Taisha Shrine during the two days we spent focusing on Kyoto. In Kyoto, we stayed at the Matsubaya Ryokan, which is a traditional Japanese inn. We took a day visit to Nara and Osaka as well, Nara being famous for the deer park, which rightfully deserves its name, with deer in abundance everywhere you go. Osaka famous for Takoyaki and its advertisements, such as the Glico running man.

Unfortunately, when we tried to leave Kyoto on Friday, Heavy rain prevented the trains from running and we couldn't get to Hiroshima. This resulted with us spending an afternoon in an Osaka and going to Nagoya a day earlier than we thought. On Sunday July 8, we were picked up by our host students. Half of the students stayed in Okazaki and the other half stayed in Achi prefecture with Takakura students, I was one of them. We spent four days with our host family. I was hosted by Momoka and her family. My time with Momoka's family was pleasant and the food was great. The students at Takakura high school were kind and welcoming, however, one fatal flaw of the school, too many stairs. During my time at the school, I experienced a traditional green tea ceremony, a home economic lesson where

I made Udon and a few classes with the English students as well.

When it was time to leave for Tokyo, it was upsetting to leave my host family and the school, as it was the host of many amazing memories on the trip. The final city was Tokyo, the capital of Japan. After checking into our hotel, we went to the Tokyo Sky tree, the tallest tower in the world with the height of 634.0 metres. Following that, dinner was at a restaurant called MOs Burger, a Japanese fast food chain which had the likes of a rice burger and Teriyaki Chicken Burger. On Friday, we spent the whole day at one of the happiest on earth, Tokyo Disneyland! Despite waiting in lines for hours I did end up going on two of the biggest attractions of the amusement park, Space Mountain and Splash Mountain, both of which were a blast! I also got the chance to see the 7.00 pm Float parade which was a tonne of fun and really amazing. However, at the end of the day, I may have spent a little bit too much money there. But hey, it may be a once in a lifetime chance!

Over the last days of our trip, we visited such famous locations such as the Shavua Crossing, Akihabara, Harajuku. And before we knew it my time in Japan was over and I had to go home. Despite some of the mishaps on the trip, it was an amazing time and an experience I won't ever forget. I implore anyone that is currently taking any language in the lower year levels to continue and maybe someday take the same opportunity I did and go visit another country. You'll definitely improve your language skills, and also create memories which you won't forget.

I stayed in Okazaki, where I got to experience some amazing tourist attractions, including Daijuji temple and Okazaki castle. I also got to meet the mayor of Okazaki, which was a daunting but rewarding experience. Attending Japanese school was also a great learning experience. My homestay allowed me to truly immerse myself in the Japanese culture, and I made so many great new friends.



New Child Care Package - Starting 2 July 2018

On 2 July 2018, the Government's new Child Care Package was launched – replacing the previous Child Care Rebate (CCR) and Child Care Benefit (CCB) with a single Child Care Subsidy (CCS).

This new subsidy is available to all families using Camp Australia services, and may affect the amount of fee assistance that each family will receive. Three things will determine a family's level of Child Care Subsidy:

- Annual income will determine the percentage of subsidy a family is eligible for,
- An activity test will determine how many hours of subsidised care families can access, and
- The type of child care service will determine the hourly rate cap (for OSHC this is \$10.29).

With the roll out of the new CCS, Additional Child Care Subsidy (ACCS) is replacing Special CCB.

What this means for parents and how you can help:

- Parents who are eligible to receive Additional Child Care Subsidy (ACCS) under the Temporary Financial Hardship category will need to submit a claim on the Centrelink website directly.
- If a child has been identified as being at risk of serious abuse or neglect, we can consider an ACCS (Child Wellbeing) claim for them. You will need to provide to your school's Key Account Manager a letter of support, which includes as much information regarding the child's circumstance, if known the details of the agency or referral body and inform the parent that we will contact them to follow up on their claim within the next week.

Should the new CCS create any hardship for parents, Camp Aust. we can organise a payment plan to help parents navigate through this challenging time, you will need to contact Camp Aust. Customer Care team to get this arranged.

Any parent enquiries regarding CCS should be directed to the attached brochure for more information, or to contact Centrelink directly. If you have any other concerns, please do not hesitate to contact our Camp Aust. Customer Care team on 1300 105 343. The team are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week (except National Public Holidays).
