# DEPUTY PRINCIPAL LEARNING AND TEACHING NEWS PREP — YEAR 12

## 2019 Class Groups

As we move into Semester 2, we will begin planning for 2019 Year 1-9 class groups. Enormous time and care will be taken to construct class groups that give all students the best possible opportunities to learn, offer them the chance to form relationships with new teachers and peers, and the opportunity to feel valued and safe.

Creating balanced, productive classes is a challenging task and students are placed in groups for a range of different reasons. As such, it is important to make sure families are aware that we cannot take requests for students to be placed with certain friends or receive requests to change class lists after they are finalized.

By this point in the year, you should feel very confident that the teachers know your child well and will make thoughtful and well-considered recommendations about where they will be best placed. If there are concerns you believe your child's teacher or coordinator may not be aware of, I would encourage you to contact your child's pastoral care and core teacher (in primary) or House Co-Ordinator (in secondary) to ensure they have any relevant information prior to the 2019 class groups being finalized.

As students move into a new year level and transition from a familiar class group to a new combination of students and new teachers, the task of making new connections can be an intimidating and sometimes anxious one for some students. Change is inevitably unsettling for everyone at times and for parents, it can be challenging to see your child bothered or even distressed about moving into a class without familiar friends. It may be helpful to engage your child in conversation over the coming months about viewing changes - like a new class group or a new year level - positively and expressing your sense of confidence that they will be able to manage this change. Each year, we observe the vast majority of students who are initially concerned about a new class and the prospect of making connections are able to settle in, form new relationships and, by the Term 1 break indicate that they are feeling connected and content within the group.

#### **NAPLAN**

Last week, students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 received their NAPLAN results in Reading, Writing, Spelling, Grammar and Numeracy.

As a school, the NAPLAN results one of a number of valuable data that provide us feedback about the effectiveness of our literacy and numeracy programs. While there is variation between individual groups of student and results can vary up or down slightly based on the nature of the specific group of students, the long-term data trends provide us with a useful measure of the overall growth we are achieving for our students.

Overall, this year's results reflected very positive trends; key highlights were the strong growth achieved in Writing and Numeracy by our Year 5 students, in Reading by our Year 7 students, and in Reading and Writing by our Year 9 students. However, the most exciting results revealed in NAPLAN were in the insight into the effectiveness of our Enhanced Learning Stream. In both Year 7 and Year 9, students achieved extraordinary rates of growth in their achievement in Reading, Writing and Numeracy.

While the trends across a year level or across multiple years are very useful, the NAPLAN results for individual students may be a useful indicator their progress. In some cases, the results may flag the need for greater support in literacy or numeracy; in other cases, it may indicate the need for extension work to fully meet the learning needs of a student. However, it is always important to remember that NAPLAN is just one set of tests, completed in one week and like any data, an individual student's NAPLAN results should never be considered in isolation.

To get a complete picture of an individual student's achievement, it is essential to 'triangulate' data – in other words, looking at a minimum of three pieces of data in order to get an accurate view of the standard a child is achieving. NAPLAN can be a useful part of this 'triangulated' picture but, like any other stand-alone test, a student's performance is impacted by various factors on the day – health & wellbeing, focus, mood, environmental factors and so on. For students in junior primary school in particular, the newness of the experience – participating in a multiple-choice test completing in silence and isolation – may impact on the reliability of the results. NAPLAN data should always be considered alongside the feedback from your child's teacher(s), that is informed by the tasks and other assessments your child completes throughout the year.

If you have any questions, concerns or queries about your child's performance on the NAPLAN testing or if you would like to discuss how the NAPLAN results align with the other sources of data about your child's achievement, please contact your child's classroom teacher, in primary, or their English and/ or Mathematics teacher, in secondary. We are currently in the process of uploading individual students' results to their SIMON profile and, until this is complete, your child's teacher may not have access to their NAPLAN results as yet. If you are contacting your child's teacher to discuss results over the next few weeks, we would suggest that you either provide the teacher with a copy of the results or that you email the teacher in advance to alert them to your desire to discuss the results so that they have the opportunity to obtain a copy of the results from myself, or the Numeracy or Literacy Coordinators in advance of your meeting.

## **ICT** Issues

The college wishes to remind you to closely monitor your children's use of email and also to actively discourage the use of social media sites, such as Roblox, Fortnite and Facebook in accordance with the age restrictions in place.

It has also come to our attention that some of our students are showing interest in a new game called Momo. What we know so far is that the 'game' part of it is linked through the WhatsApp application that is available on smart phones and tablets. The game itself is based on a series of tasks and challenges that encourage students to engage in increasingly serious risk-taking behaviour. The college wishes to advise that there have been safety warnings related to this site and as such, it is our **strong recommendation** that you do not allow your children/children to access this site.

Additionally, as relayed to you in a previous newsletter, the College is supporting these restrictions and safety guidelines by discouraging student engagement in these sites/games by not allowing students to:

- Talk about these sites in class and whilst at school
- Write and read about these sites or about characters or events within these sites/games in class.
- Engage in oral language activities such as 'Show and Tell' about any of these sites/games
- Play with any toy or game connected to these sites/ games whilst at school
- Use an image related to these sites/games at school or as a screen saver
- We thank you for support in promoting Child Safety at the College

## STUDENT WELLBEING

#### R U OK? DAY

R U Ok Day is celebrated annually on the 2nd Thursday of September. In 2018, the official day for R U Ok is Thursday 13 September. Students in primary school we celebrated R U OK day on Friday September 7. Year levels participated in a variety of activities which provided opportunities to introduce and emphasise to students the value of close connections and strong relationships.

Asking, 'Are you OK?' seeks to create a world where we're all connected. We're never too young to look out for one another and meaningfully connect. R U OK? Day develops an awareness in students of others and of showing understanding and empathy to peers in need.

Being able to meaningfully support someone and strengthening peer-to-peer support skills should begin in the early years of a child's life through teaching them to look after themselves and their peers.

A range of circumstances can lead to a child feeling low, including:

- Big life changes like moving to a new house or school
- Experiencing grief or loss
- Being around people going through tough times
- Being bullied
- Arguing with someone
- Problems with school work
- Being bored
- Having a medical condition or chronic illness
- · Not sleeping well
- Not exercising enough
- Hormonal changes
- Special needs

Children cannot be expected to fix someone's problems, nor know the best way to help and support. However, they can be encouraged to listen to what their friend is saying, let them know they care and tell a teacher, school counsellor or trusted adult if they are worried about their friend. By promoting an environment of positive peer support and accessing support channels via an adult, children can learn that asking, 'Are you OK?' is a key life skill.

R U OK? has 4 Conversation Steps to help navigate a conversation when someone says, "No, I'm not OK". These steps are:









Useful contacts when a child is not OK:

- Parent/s, Teacher, Carer
- School counsellor
- GP or psychologist
- Kids Helpline on 1800 55 1800
- Lifeline on 13 11 14
- '000' if life is in imminent danger

It is important that we consider asking "are you OK?" not just on R U OK? Day, but a practice that occurs often to develop positive peer relationships throughout their lives.
