# DEPUTY PRINCIPAL STAFF AND OPERATIONS PREP – YEAR 12

#### The 'New Normal' for Term 3

As a College we are very proud of the ways in which our students, parents/guardians and staff adapted to the many changes to life both off- and on-campus across Term 2. From Home Learning to staggered starts to restricted drop-off / pick-up routines, our community has admirably embraced the 'new normal' and in its various iterations. As Deputy Principal Staff & Operations I have personally experienced the transition to Home Learning and back again and enjoyed interacting with many of you in a new role as part-time traffic warden and Prep crossing guide.

While we anticipate being able to restore greater normality to the opening and closing times of the vehicle and pedestrian gates, for the protection of the health of our staff and students we will continue to ask parents to remain outside the school yard when on foot. There will remain no on-campus parking for parents in Term 3 and parents driving through drop-off / pick-up zones are asked to please continue to remain in your vehicle.

To aid your child in spotting your car in the pick-up line, we recommend printing a large-font colour copy of your surname or child's name (whichever they are most likely to recognise) and placing it either in your rear passenger window or on the sunscreen visor so that your child can more quickly identify your car.





From the start of Term 3, all students – including our Preps – will return to their normal drop-off times in the morning to be at school by 8.45am. One parent/guardian of Prep, Year 1 and Year 2 students arriving by foot may now enter via Pedestrian Gate 1 or 2 in order to escort their child across the drop-off zone pedestrian crossings in the morning. The Courtyard (Finance) gate, House 1 gate and Prep House gate are the drop-off points for students in Prep, Years 1 and 2. Parents are asked not to enter these gates for any reason. Parents are asked to exit the College immediately after their children have entered the schoolyard as there is still a requirement for parents not to congregate around schools.

All students will also return to concluding the day at 3.15pm. Parents/guardians of Year 3-12 students arriving by foot are asked to remain outside the property for pick-up. For Prep, Year 1 & 2 students, **one** parent or guardian will be permitted to enter via pedestrian gate 1 (near vehicle Gate B) to use the Prep crossing to meet your child in the pedestrian pick-up area, entering via the gate near Prep House to pick up your Prep – Year 2 student(s). Parents/guardians using this option are asked to please carefully observe the social-distancing markers and pay careful attention to staff instruction to enter via the Prep

House Gate and quickly leave the property via the House 1 gate (please see the map below). Where an older sibling is able to accompany the P-2 child off the property, this should be the preferred option.



Opening and closing times for the vehicle and pedestrian gates will be communicated closer to the start of Term 3, pending further advice from the Victorian Chief Health Office and the CECV.

### Return of Co-curricular Activities On-Campus

From 22 June, schools are permitted to conduct most co-curricular activities, including self-contained camps and certain inter-school sports. This will enable the College to run the Year 11 Retreat as scheduled for July 30-31 and to re-schedule the Year 6 and Year 7 camps for Term 4, should this advice remain valid. Excitingly, we have been able to reschedule our Senior Production 'High School Musical' for the week of 24 – 28 August, and look forward to restrictions easing to the point that our dedicated performers and support crew will be able to welcome a live audience in some capacity.

Parents will receive details for any camps and other events that will be proceeding closer to the time via CareMonkey.

#### Sacramental Programs

At the time of writing, there is no clarity about the resumption of First Communion and Confirmation programs for 2020. We eagerly await the advice of the Archdiocese of Melbourne and the Chief Health Officer in the hope that both of these important faith milestones will be able to proceed either late in Term 3 or during Term 4; however, this is out of our control due to the COVID-19 restrictions.

#### School Photos Have Arrived

All school photos were delivered to the College by National Photography this week and should be brought home by your child on either Wednesday 24 or Thursday 25 June. If your child has not brought them home by Thursday evening, please contact your child's Core / Tutor teacher.

As the state government has yet to announce when schools may be permitted to have incursions, we are unable to reschedule those who missed their individual photo. Once this is permitted, the College will negotiate a date with National Photography and publicise this to parents/guardians.

# DEPUTY PRINCIPAL LEARNING AND TEACHING PREP – YEAR 12

#### **Student Reporting**

With the extended period of Home Learning this term as a result of COVID-19, our usual ways of working and engaging with students looked very different. Included in this change has been how we assess and report on student learning. Our school, teachers, students and families have all had to adapt, change and respond to the landscape and this was sometimes daily. There were also countless positive opportunities and new learning, but there were also challenges. All our students have achieved and contributed during this time and we thank every family member and member of our staff for their encouragement, feedback, patience and willingness to protect learning continuity for all. Given the nature of most of Term 2, our reports will not contain a reference to progression points, as the usual assessments undertaken in the everyday classroom have not been possible. The end of year report (December) will provide details around your child's learning progression. The Semester 1 reports will be published Friday, 24 July via PAM.

### VCE – Seminars and Holiday Homework

With Unit 3 concluding this week, our Year 12 and accelerated Year 11 students are now past the halfway point of their scored studies for this year. Over the upcoming holidays there are a number of externally facilitated VCE seminars that your son or daughter may wish to attend. Whilst some of these incur a cost, there are a number of free sessions. During these workshops, students are often given a range of revision strategies and the common mistakes made in previous exams will be highlighted. The programs are often structured to assist students with learning activities that can reinforce the key knowledge and will enable students to plan and implement good study skills for the end of the year. Some of the VCE seminar providers include ATAR notes, TSFX – The School for Excellence and TSSM.

#### Save the Date - Subject Selection

The Subject Selection process is an annual event that involves students in Years 7-11. Throughout the process students are asked to consider their areas of interest and future pathways, in order to select suitable subjects for the forthcoming year. The subject selection evening will take place on **Tuesday 28 July.** Given the current restrictions on gatherings the format of the subject selection evening will alter this year. # Vinnies Winter Appeal and 'Camp out at Home'

Thank you so much for your generosity in fundraising through the week. At last count, Marymede had raised \$1500.00 for the work of Vinnies in this area.

Students and families attempted to experience a sense of solidarity with our homeless on Friday June 19 for the Marymede Vinnies 'Winter Camp-out at Home'. A number of students shared in a workshop with Vinnies Youth Resource Officer Sarah Taylor on Friday afternoon to gain an understanding of the context of homelessness. Faith and Mission Captains Rachel, Alex and Jacob facilitated a Zoom debrief session on Saturday morning and the overwhelming experience of the participants was one of discomfort and the realisation that they have more choice than those who are vulnerable. Here are some quotes from participants:

Boyan Poposki (Year 7): All the luxuries that we take for granted and all the benefits that we have, homeless people don't have all these benefits. The main thing I took from this night is all the repercussions and side effects of homelessness and how they don't choose to be homeless and live with the consequences.

Mikayla Henry (Year 5): I noticed that we are so very lucky to have a warm bed and a roof over our head and that we just did it for one night, imagine all the people who sleep in the cold every night.

John Roflo (Year 11): We noticed not to take our things for granted and the fact that we had each other. A lot of people probably don't have others to converse with or keep them company.

Arsh Singh (Year 7): I realised how all the noise from the road can keep you up all night and how uncomfortable it is to sleep on cardboard. It made me think of homeless people who have to go through it every day.

Ms Malusu: I had the option to stay inside because I was too afraid to be by myself outside and the homeless do not have that choice. I am more appreciative that I have a roof over my head where I can feel safe. Having a filling meal is also something to be grateful for.

Franswa Al Maleh (Year 5): I feel bad for the homeless people because they don't get to sleep in homes they sleep outside in the cold rainy night and they don't get to eat a lot of food. My experience last night was I was cold and hungry, and I was thinking about the homeless people last night because of the cold rainy weather.







#### Year 11 Retreat

All Year 11 students will engage in an overnight retreat from Thursday 30 – Friday 31 July. There will be two House groups per venue, with each venue able to accommodate appropriate COVID-19 measures. Further details will be sent to Year 11 families this week.

#### Sacraments Update

**First Reconciliation**: Year 3 students will be prepared for this over the course of Term 3, with the intention to experience this sacrament in the last few weeks of term. The format is still to be determined, fortunately we have Fr John available to work with the children in their class groups.

First Eucharist: Year 4 students will be prepared for this over the course of Term 4, with the intention of receiving this sacrament in November. Students will also experience Reconciliation with Fr John during Term 3. The format is still to be confirmed.

At this stage we still have the booking at the Cathedral for Sunday 13 September with Bishop Terry; however, there may be restrictions on capacity in place. Bishop Terry is also awaiting advice from Archbishop Peter Comensoli as to how this sacrament can be administered.

# **Units 3&4 Engineering Studies**

My name is Mathew Garro and I am currently completing my Certificate II in Engineering Studies at the Trade Skills Centre. For this subject, I was assigned to fabricate a steel vice from 6mm thick steel plate and mild steel round bar. We started by modelling the project in Fusion 360 CAD and once proof of concept was achieved Mr. Powter reached out to his contacts to have the steel plates cut out using an advanced manufacturing process (CNC plasma cutter). This machine cut out all plates within a matter of minutes, whereas if it were to be done by hand, I wouldn't be writing at this very moment.



When the parts where retrieved, I started cleaning off the burrs and fitting it together like a jigsaw puzzle.



It was my first time learning how to use a Metal Inert Gas (MIG) welding process. The results left more to be desired, but with more practice, it eventually got to an acceptable level. Never in one thousand years will it break. Last year the curriculum had many easy projects that introduced me to the mill, lathe, and guillotine. The task of getting the vice done in the mill and lathe was far more challenging than previous attempts.



It all paid off, everything was to the correct measurement within the tolerance. Aside from some minor deviations from the original plans, it turned out perfect.
