DEPUTY PRINCIPAL LEARNING AND TEACHING NEWS PREP – YEAR 12

New in 2017 – PMP Program for Preps, 1's and 2's

In our last newsletter, I referred to the significant number of new learning and teaching programs we have introduced this year to expand the opportunities for our students to fully realise their potential. Over the next few weeks I look forward to sharing some more details about these programs and bringing you updates on the experiences of our students in these new programs.

PMP (the Perceptual Motor Program) is the first of these exciting initiatives. Specifically designed for students in their early years of primary school, PMP exposes students to a range of movements that aim to develop their perceptions of themselves and to build the range of skills required to manage the demands of schooling.

Students in Prep, Grade 1 and Grade 2 will have one PMP lesson with a specialist teacher once a fortnight and will follow this up with shorter sessions in between with their classroom teacher to reinforce and continue to master the skills taught each cycle.

We are delighted to have Mrs Stacey Brice stepping into the role of PMP specialist this year. Having coordinated the PMP program in a previous school, Stacey is a strong advocate for the benefits of PMP in fostering students' capacity as learners and giving them opportunities to developing perception, judgement, focus, eye movement, fine motor skills and the range of other abilities they need in the classroom and beyond.

To be effective, the PMP program does require many hands and we are seeking parent helpers to support this important program. The tasks for parent helpers are straightforward and do not require previous experience or special training. If you are willing and able to support the PMP program, we would be delighted to hear from you.

Year 12 Information Evening

It was fantastic to see so many Year 10 and Year 11 parents attend our recent VCE/VCAL Information Evening earlier this week. Next Tuesday, the Year 12 Parent Information Evening will be held in the Auditorium from 7pm and will provide parents with key information to assist them to support their sons and daughters through this final – challenging – year of secondary schooling. It would be great to see all Year 12 parents on the night.

Homework

Homework remains one of the perennial issues for parents and teachers, with the concerns that arise varying depending on the year level.

1. 'My son/daughter is getting too much homework'

A concern most common to Year 7 parents, this can be the result of a number of things. In some instances, the desire of a Year 7 student to put do their best can sometimes result in them investing too much time in every task they are given. For these students, they will need support from parents and teachers to develop the ability to prioritise and discern how much time and 'presentation' to give to tasks. Encourage them to ask their teachers: 'how long should this task take?'

Using the recommended homework/study times advertised in last week's newsletter, set a regular time for your son or daughter to complete their homework (including a firm finishing time), and encourage them to spend a few minutes planning out how they will use the time and how long they will spend on each task.

If concerns arise with homework or if you believe your son or daughter is receiving too much homework from one or more subjects, we would encourage parents to contact the relevant subject teacher, Tutor Teacher or House Coordinator.

2. 'My son/daughter doesn't get enough homework'

A concern more common to parents of Year 9-11 students, this is easily resolved by changing the question you may be asking.

Typically, parents ask their children: 'Have you got any homework?' Instead, using the study/homework times published in the last newsletter, set a regular time for your son or daughter at home and begin to ask the question: 'What are you going to work on tonight?'

If your son or daughter has nights when they have not been allocated specific tasks to complete, they can use the time profitably by:

- Completing additional or extension tasks eg. Maths exercises
- Reading or re-reading their English texts
- Reviewing notes or preparing revision notes
- Pre-reading for upcoming topics
- Wider reading/research about a topic currently being studied
- Beginning preparation for upcoming assignments
- Writing practice essays for English
- Using Maths Space
- Teaching a younger sibling something they are currently learning

Where possible, have your son or daughter complete their homework in a family space, rather than isolated in a bedroom

or separate area. If they are using technology during this time, ensure that the screen is visible to you; escaping onto social networking or internet browsing during this time will be a hard habit for your son or daughter to try to break in VCE.

Sacrament of Confirmation:

The Blessed sacrament of Confirmation is a Catholic sacrament celebrated by students baptised within the Catholic Church. If your child is baptised within the Catholic Church they are invited to celebrate this Sacrament. Confirmation is a strengthening and deepening of the grace of Baptism. In the Catholic Church, Confirmation is usually celebrated when a person is old enough to respond consciously and participate in the rite. This sacrament invites the candidate into a stronger and more explicit participation in the Church by the rite of laying on of hands and sealing with chrism. A bishop or authorised priest administers the sacrament.

In Orthodox Churches and in the Eastern Rites of the Catholic Church, Confirmation is administered by the priest immediately after Baptism. It is not a sacrament that is repeated.

At Marymede Catholic College Confirmation is celebrated at Year 6.

Primary News

It has been a wonderful start to the 2017 school year, with children smiling and happy. Most are very excited to be in a new classroom with a new teacher and friends. I thank you for your support in helping the children feel positive and safe in their new environment. We welcome many new students and families to the College and hope you feel a part of our vibrant College community.

We encourage you to support our students to comply with College expectations regarding uniform, footwear, jewellery, hair and grooming regulations which apply to all students within the College. Staff will be vigilant in following up students who may be in breach of the regulations and issue Primary students an infringement notice informing you of the College regulations so you can make the necessary adjustments. Please read the following document which specifies College regulations, which can be found on the College website and also on Page 12 of the Primary Student Diary (Years 4-6). Also attached is a flyer indicating appropriate school footwear. If you have any questions or need clarification please do not hesitate to send me an email.

INFORMATION DIRECTORY

UNIFORM REGULATIONS

- The College hat for Primary girls and boys must be worn during the summer months (Term 1 and Term 4), travelling to and from the college, during recess and lunchtime and is compulsory for all PE and sport activities.
- and sport activities. No garments other than those stated on the uniform list are to be visible. This includes coloured T-Shirts or singlets which are visible through shirts, boxer shorts under dresses, compression clothing (ie: skins), and socks beneath or over tights.
- Girls' dresses or skirts must be knee length. When the full uniform cannot be worn for some good reason, parents are asked to notify the Pastoral Teacher in writing. .
- Primary students are permitted to wear their College House uniform on House sports days, Marymede Day, House Athletics Carnival and on other House occasions as advertised in the College Newsletter / Calendar.
- The College tracksuit pants and windcheater may be purchased and worn in the cooler months of the year, over the top of the College sport shorts and top.
- The only sport uniform items that students are permitted to wear is uniform bearing the Marymede Catholic College logo. This includes House polo shirts.

JEWELLERY

- At Marymede, students are permitted to ear one small silver or gold stud.
- The sleeper or stud must be worn in the bottom part of the ear lobe, no stones and only one sleeper or stud.
- Any other visible piercing of any form is not permitted. Clear plastic plugs or band-aids over piercings not acceptab
- No other jewellery may be worn with the exception of watches, and the only Christian symbol permitted is a simple gold or silver chain and cross around the neck; this is not to be a fashion accessory, but rather an expression of faith.

HAIRSTYLES

The College expects students to be well groomed in appearance at all times whilst wearing the College uniform. Hair, in general terms, must be clean, neatly styled and tied back off the face. Accessories must be in College colours of either ink blue or marioon. Hairstyles which are outside of the following guidelines: unacceptable

- . Hair which is shoulder length or longer must be tied back at all times so that the hair does not touch the collar
- No hair should be allowed to fall across the face. .
- Extreme hairstyles are not permitted. This includes dreadlocks, shaved hair less than a number 3 blade, severe variations in hair length and /or colour, etc.
- Hair must be natural in colour in the student's natural tonal range. Unnatural hair colours are never
 permitted. Tips and streaks that are different from the natural colour are not permitted. • All fringes must be above the eyebrows and away from the face.

MAKE-UP

Make-up is not acceptable at any time. Coloured nail polish, nail extensions and false nails are not permitted. Students will be asked to remove make-up.

SCHOOL SHOES

- Regulation leasther lace-up with a heel are the regulation school shoe. Girls have the option of a T-Bar shoe which must be buckled at all times. Due to safety reasons, the regulation lace-up shoe is the preferred shoe for both boys and girls.
- The Sport shoe must be a proper sport shoe with ankle and heel support. No fashion shoe or canvas sport shoe is acceptable, nor should they be worn at any time.
