COVID-Safe measures for Term 2: notification of Household contacts

As we continue to learn to live with COVID-19, the following measures are in place for Term 2 to ensure our College remains a safe environment for our students and staff:

Students identified as household contacts: Students who are identified as Household contacts may continue to attend school under the following conditions:

- A parent or guardian must register the student as a Household contact via the Marymede COVID Household Contacts notification form; and
- Year 3 – 12 students must wear a mask indoors at all times (also strongly advised for P-2); and
- the student must undertake at least five negative rapid tests over the seven days (from first exposure to the positive case); and
- they must remain asymptomatic.
- *N.B. Students who have previously tested positive for COVID-19 will not be classified as a Household contact for 12 weeks after the end of their isolation period.*

Reporting positive COVID results: Should any student receive a positive RAT or PCR result, a parent or guardian must report this result to the college via the Marymede COVID Notification Form.

The College will notify relevant families through a daily email when a student or staff member has returned a positive COVID-19 result and had attended the college. This email will identify any classes affected and advise students to undertake a RAT and only return to school if they receive a negative result and are asymptomatic.

Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) 'surveillance' testing:

For each 2-week period (up to at least 20 May), families will be supplied with a 5-pack of RAT home-tests (one pack per child) to be conducted on two school days each fortnight. These should be used on two school days in each week, regardless of whether or not your child shows any



COVID symptoms or may have been in contact with a positive case.

If your child receives a positive RAT test result at any time, a parent or guardian must register this result through the Department of Health system via COVID-19 Positive Rapid Antigen Test Self-Reporting Form or 1800 675 398 (please also see the previous point for informing the college).

There is no requirement to report a negative result.

N.B. Students who have previously tested positive for COVID-19 do not need to undertake RAT surveillance testing for 12 weeks after the end of their isolation period.

Parents & carers welcome on-campus for pick-up: parents & carers are welcome to enter the campus to meet your child for pickup. While parents / carers are also welcome to walk their child onto campus for morning drop-off, we ask that you please exit the campus once your child has deposited their bag at their safety line / locker. Please do not enter any buildings during either of these times.

Students who are unwell must stay home: The most important action school communities can take to reduce the risk of transmission of coronavirus (COVID-19) is to ensure that any unwell staff and students remain at home and get tested, even with the mildest of symptoms (and even with a negative RAT or PCR result).

No food-sharing: No food-sharing is permitted. This extends to a ban on home-made birthday treats: while we appreciate the need to mark milestones (particularly in the Primary years), this may only be done using pre-packaged foods.

Face Masks & Physical distancing: While face masks are recommended whenever physical distancing is not possible, as per the latest directions of the Victorian Government, they are no longer mandatory in most situations:

- All students and staff are strongly encouraged to wear a face mask when indoors.
- **Face masks must be worn by individuals over the age of 8 when on public transport and school buses** – unless you have a lawful exemption.
- Parents and carers conducting drop-off and pick-up who are unable to maintain social distance should also wear a face covering
- Individuals over the age of 8 must carry a face mask at all times.



Proof of full vaccination to work with students: Where parents and visitors are granted permission to work with students in any capacity (either paid or voluntary), this is conditional on acceptable proof of being fully vaccinated (i.e., 3 doses of an approved vaccine).

We thank all parents and carers and students for your continuing patience, understanding and cooperation in assisting to keep our community safe.

Year 9 – 12 Examinations

In June, all Year 9 – 12 students will undertake end of semester examinations. The purpose of the examinations is to provide students with an opportunity to demonstrate their learning, practice the skills required in testing situations, and to reflect on their academic growth over the past months. The results and feedback from their examinations are useful in planning their way forward, such as identifying study & revision techniques that work best for them, and also guiding subject selections, pathway and career planning into areas of strength and interest.

- Unit 3 Trial examinations: 7 – 10 June
- Unit 1/2 examinations: 14 – 17 June
- Year 10 examinations: 14 – 17 June
- Year 9 examinations: 15 – 17 June

Students should already be preparing for their examinations with their class teachers. They will be provided with Revision Guides in the coming weeks to assist their preparation in addition to the support provided by their teachers.

Year 10 – 12 students are required on campus for their examinations only. If they have sessions in the morning and the afternoon, they may stay at / return home or can undertake private study in the Resource Centre. Year 9 students who have parental permission via Operoo, will be permitted to travel directly home to undertake study in the afternoon. Students who are absent from examinations will be contacted to attend catch-up sessions.

NAPLAN – Year 3, 5, 7 & 9

Congratulations to students on the completion of the 2022 NAPLAN. Although the new online format was a very different experience, we are confident that our students coped well with the changes presented to them. Once results are available later in the year, they will be distributed to parents.

This term in Year 6 the students are investigating ‘How does the changing world affect us?’ We know our students have a lot of understanding on so many different topics, so we always make sure to find out what the students already know and what they are interested in. This allows us, as teachers, to make sure we are engaging the students in new learning as well as ensuring we account for student voice – what do the students have wonderings about? What are the students interested in?


So, with this in mind the Year 6 teachers asked their students, “How has our world changed?” The responses were wide and varied. A few responses were as follows,

- **PAST:** “There was no internet”,

- **PAST:** “Less pollution”,
- **PAST:** “No war ...yet”
- **PAST:** “No I-phone”
- **PRESENT:** “Most countries now are free and have fair equality”
- **PRESENT:** “Almost everyone has freedom and rights”

- **PRESENT:** “The animals can’t survive because there is not much ice for them to hide and rest.”

The students will be looking in more depth about how human impact and natural events change our environments and in turn, how these events impact all areas of our lives: social, financial and environmental.

RESPECTFUL RELATIONSHIPS

You may have seen in the media recently (see Channel 9 News Report – 28 March 2022) or have had discussions with family and friends around a spike in vaping amongst young people. The College has concerns that young people may not fully understand or appreciate the negative impact of vaping on their health and the addictive nature of vaping. Additionally, we are concerned that young people under the age of 18 years are gaining access to vapes when it is illegal for them to undertake the activity or purchase the products associated with vaping.

Naturally, vaping is not allowed at school. The College has installed vape detectors to support the health and safety of students, and consequences apply should a student be found vaping or possessing the products of vaping.

The College is also exploring means of providing authentic education for students around the dangers of vaping. We welcome working with and supporting parents in discussing this issue with their child. To assist you with educating your child about the short and long-term health impacts of vaping, we highly recommend the material found in the link below from the Royal Children's Hospital.
